Reception Classes – Acorn and Chestnut

Welcome back, it is hard to believe that this is the last half term for the children in Reception!

This half term we start our final topic 'Where in the World'. We started our learning on this, this week by looking at transport and how we can travel to places far and near. The children have drawn and painted pictures of transport, practised their cutting skills and played with lots of different types of transport such as cars, boats in the water and planes. In both classes the children have enjoyed the new role play areas too. Chestnut now have an airport and Acorn have a Travel Agents.

The sun also came out this week allowing us to enjoy time outside. The children decorated the path outside Acorn and Chestnut with the chalks. We were also able to go on the field to practise for sports day. The children had a try at the sack race and using the egg and spoons. They all look forward to showing you their skills on sports day.

Year 1 – Hawthorn and Willow

In English this week we have been looking at the suffix '-ing' and how we can use this with verbs (action words)

In Maths we have been working on place value to 100, including using 10's to count.

In RE this week, we have been thinking about the 5 pillars of Islam and why they are so important to Muslims.

In science we have been exploring the lifecycle of a bean. The children in Willow class have been looking at how the bean is growing since Mrs Taylor planted it in her garden. Some children were really enthusiastic when talking about how they were growing fruit and vegetables in their garden.

Year 2 – Maple and Sycamore

We have been extremely busy this week getting creative with clay and creating our tiles. We used lots of methods to create our pieces such as score and slip and impressing. We are excited to them when they have dried.

Yesterday we had an amazing day at Herrings Green Farm on our trip. It was incredible to see so many birds and experience them up close. From, flying owls to holding cockroaches, we are proud that we challenged ourselves and faced our fears. There were many highlights to choose from but we loved watching the birds of prey show and learning more about these amazing creatures. Thank you to all the adults who came with us to make the trip possible!



Year 3 – Palm and Pine

This week in Year 3, as part of our DT lessons the children have been learning where food comes from. The children have learned about the origins of different foods and explored seasonal foods and the importance of eating seasonal produce. They then cooked using British ingredients available all year round. The children had a great time baking fairy cakes using British produce to make them.



Year 4 – Elm and Oak

This week we have begun lots of new units of learning. In DT, we have begun to find out about kites of the world in preparation for when we design and make our own kites. In English, we have watched all about a Phoenix bird called Evol who will help us to write a diary entry from a different perspective. Finally, in PE we have begun to learn the skills and rules needed for netball.

Conifer class

The children have continued to access their personalised curriculum in English and Maths whilst building and strengthening relationships with their peers and adults. Some of the children continue to access some mainstream lessons in the afternoons.

In our Hamish and Milo sessions, we continue to think more deeply about friendship and what 'friendship' means. We have been thinking about how to be assertive with our friends to let them know that we don't like something they are doing.

Some children have started to learn about different types of lines in Art & Design. We have continued to be creative in our learning and are enjoying the sunshine! Other children have continued to access many of their lessons with their mainstream class. We have also made junk model musical instruments!



Medicines in school

Medicines should only be administered in school when it would be detrimental to a child's health or school attendance not to. Medicines should be left at the school office where parents will be asked to give their consent for medication to be administered by completing a Medicine Record Form.

Prescribed medicines

Where clinically possible, medicines are generally prescribed in dose frequencies, which enable them to be taken outside of school hours. For example, antibiotics prescribed to be taken 3 times a day could be given before school, after school and before bed and would not need to be administered in school.

Schools can only accept prescribed medicines that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration, dosage and storage. The exception to this is insulin, which must still be in date, but will generally be available to schools inside an insulin pen or a pump, rather than in its original container.

Non-prescribed medicines

Non-prescribed medicines such as Calpol and Piriton will only be administered in exceptional circumstances and where there is a clear and genuine medical need.

Euro 2024 is well underway and many will be looking forward to exciting matches. Women's Aid have produced the above poster as part of their Come Together to End Domestic Abuse campaign. However, in 2022 data showed that reported incidents of domestic abuse increased by 26% when the England football team plays, with a 38% increase if England lost their game. Reported incidents increased the day after matches by 11%, regardless of the match outcome (research conducted by National Centre for Domestic Violence).

We know that domestic abuse can affect anybody, so support is available to everybody (including if you are concerned about your own behaviours - the <u>Chrysalis Centre</u> or <u>Respect Helpline</u> can provide information).

Water Safety - Quarries

Dear Parents and Guardians

As we are approaching the summer months following a particularly wet winter, I would like to provide some information and support in relation to water safety. Bedfordshire Fire & Rescue Service along with our partners including the Police and Local Authorities have recently been contacted by residents and business owners who are concerned for the safety of young people who are accessing quarries for leisure activities.

Unfortunately, accidental drownings happen all too frequently and even the strongest swimmers can find themselves in difficulties. There are also concerns for young and vulnerable people who may not be aware of the danger and risks that water poses.

Quarry water is normally far colder than river or sea water, and it can send your body into cold water shock or leave you too exhausted to swim within minutes of jumping in. The water is also often extremely deep, with steep drop offs, and shallow water can change to deep water quickly. Quarry water can also contain hazards such as entrapments, weeds, rubbish, drains, broken bottles and pollution.

The fire service is unable to stop people swimming outside or in open water, but if you have concerns of anti-social behavior, please report this to the Police non-emergency number on 101.

If someone is in trouble in the water and needs help in an emergency, please call 999.
